New Jersey appeals to the U.S. Supreme Court in its quest to legalize sports betting

New Jersey is asking the U.S. Supreme Cournate the final call on whether the state can legalize sports betting.

Following a steady stream of defeats in loweurts, New Jersey has filed a petition asking the highest federal court to take these that calls intquestion the subject of states' rights. Some believe a ruling in favor of the state could pide a much-needed bodds Atlantic City's economy.

State Sen. Raymond Lesniak, a strosupporter of the state's quessatid the court will decide by May or June whether it will takthe case. Lesniak, Dnion, has described some of the blows dealt as devastating setbacks, but said he remains hopefultthe state can be successful.

"The bottom line is, if you're ntoin it, you can't win it, and we're in it," Lesniak said.

More than two years ago, New Jersey votemes whelmingly approved referendum to allow sports betting at Atlantic City casinos and lee racing tracks. Since then, however, the National Collegiate Athletic Association alreeveral professional sports the bave foughth state with a lawsuit, prohibiting it from entering the dustry expected to be worth billions.

The objections are based on a 1992 federal lawnlogate but four states from authorizing sports wagering. Those four states Nevada, Delaware, Montana a Odegon—legalized practice before the law was passed.

The petition filed on behalf of Gov. Chris Chiresand other state parties Feb. 12 asks the Supreme Court to consider whet the prohibition under the Professional and Amateur Sports Protection Act, also known as PAPSA, violattes U.S. Constitution bijnfringing on states' rights.
