**Atlantic City 2018 budget will not increase property taxes** - As reported by **The Press of Atlantic City**, on Tuesday, June 12, Atlantic City officials announced that the city's \$225 million, 2018 budget would not include a tax increase for city property owners. Officials said the sale of \$49 million in bonds (approved by the council in April 2018) helped to pay down the city's debts and prevent a tax increase in 2018.

**Miss America Organization announces producer for Miss America 2.0** - According to a June 18 **Press Release**, the Miss America Organization will partner with Global Road Entertainment to produce the revised 2019 Miss America Competition scheduled to air on ABC on Sept. 9.

**State budget committees approve growth zone bill for Atlantic City Airport**- As reported by **The Press of Atlantic City**, a bill creating a Garden State Growth Zone around Atlantic City International Airport was approved by the state Assembly and Senate budget committees and will be sent to the full Legislature for a vote. Former New Jersey Governor, Chris Christie, vetoed a similar bill in January 2018 citing the bill's inclusion of growth zone benefits extending to Atlantic City, Camden, Passaic, Paterson and Trenton. The new bill will be exclusive to Atlantic City International Airport and a one-mile radius around it.

**Stockton University Institutes report status of New Jersey's beaches**- As reported by **WHYY**, on June 27 Stockton University's William J. Hughes Center for Public Policy and the Coastal Research Center announced the findings of their research into the condition of New Jersey's beaches. University researchers and state and federal officials confirmed that New Jersey's beaches are in very good condition and in better shape than before Hurricane Sandy.
