

After Kristallnacht (“the night of broken glass”) on Nov. 9-10, 1938, Jews were targeted synagogues and Jewish homes and businesses, the protests were suppressed. Kristallnacht refers to the shards of shattered glass that littered the streets of the attack. Eventually all Jewish businesses were sold, usually at a loss, and taken over by non-Jews, or closed.

“Final Sale” is free, open to the public and will be viewed by over 100,000 students and educators, as part of the state’s mandate to teach about the Holocaust and genocide. Sponsors of the exhibit have provided funds to bring school buses and their teachers to the exhibit for guided tours.
