School of Education, Master's in Education Programs Earn 7-Year Accreditation



Stockton's Teacher Education Program and its Master's in Education program have each received seven-year, unconditional accreditation from the Teacher Education Accreditation Council (TEAC).

"This notification represents a significant accomplishment on the part of the students, faculty, staff, and alumni of the Teacher Education undergraduate and graduate programs at Stockton," said Dr. Harvey Kesselman, provost and executive vice president. "Given the incredible achievements by so many of our graduates in the field of education, it is nice to see that the national accrediting body has awarded Stockton its highest endorsement."
