Author Mary Roach Speaks at Largest Freshman Convocation

This year's Freshman Convocation on Sept. 26 was Stockton's largest ever, with author Mary Roach speaking, answering questions and signing copies of her book, "Spook: Science Tackles the Afterlife."

Her book exemplified the Freshman Year Experience (FYE) academic theme, "Believe It or Not," in which students examine the nature of belief, and understand the difference between belief and knowledge.

Dr. GT Lenard, coordinator of Freshman Seminars, said, "Tom Grites did a great job of getting Ms. Roach to campus. She is a well-known and respected science writer who has done TED talks, appeared on numerous TV shows, and written three other books and countless articles for publications like The Smithsonian. It was our best-attended Convocation and a huge success for our freshmen."

Dr. Hallock-Waters Raising Funds for Brain Cancer at NYC Marathon



Dr. Kristen Hallock-Waters, assistant professor of Chemistry, will be running her third New York City Marathon on Sunday, Nov. 3 to support the Tug McGraw Foundation. Hallock-Waters runs marathons in memory of her late husband Jeffrey Waters who fought a four-year battle with an aggressive stage IV brain tumor.

"Ironically, Jeff's diagnosis came the same day the baseball great, Tug McGraw, lost his own life to the same disease. Jeff's initial prognosis was grim, but we sought help at The Duke University Brain Tumor Center and Jeff survived nearly 4 years with good quality of life," Dr. Hallock-Waters said.
